

THE United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organisation (UNESCO) notes that the issue of quality and relevance in technical and vocational education and training (TVET) is an area of concern for many countries around the world.

It states: "In this light curricula reform in pursuit of meeting the labour market needs...and incorporation of relevant subjects (has) become part of the major activities of UNESCO's TVET programme.'

The international agency has specific projects underway to assist member states in curriculum reform and also to integrate subjects and components such as environmental training, entrepreneurship and career guidance into the TVET curricula.

Quality in TVET

The issue of "quality" in TVET is one that will be on the agenda of the upcoming conference being hosted by Caribbean Area Network for Quality Assurance in Tertiary Education (CANQATE) in October 2009.

CANQATE notes that quality in tertiary education and training connotes the meeting of requisite standards and criteria established by external quality assurance agencies. It states:

'Competency-Based Education and Training (CBET) are rooted in occupational standards which have been developed with input from employers and other key stakeholders.

It adds: "CBET assures that the skills, knowledge, understanding and attitudes of the workforce will meet the needs of employment."

Some of the TVET related issues which the 2009 Conference is expected to address include:

• The TVET and academia • The roles of various stakeholders in tertiary education and training: the relevance of the curricula

• The role of cooperative education in a challenging environment

• The mismatch between tertiary education and the labour market, and, Strategies for the transition from school to the world of work.

Other key topics to be discussed over the three-day period include developing internal quality assurance systems; strategic approaches to quality tertiary education and training, and enhancing the sector through partnerships with the alumni and the community.

CANQATE is a professional body established in 2004 as a sub-network of the worldwide organisation, the International Network for **Quality Assurance Agencies** in Higher Education (INQAAHE). It is a new initiative in the field of Quality Assurance pertinent to tertiary education in the Caribbean. The principal purpose of the worldwide network is to "enable members to share information about the maintenance, evaluation, accreditation and

improvement of higher education, and to disseminate good practices in the field of Quality Assurance". The aims of CANQATE are

compatible with those of INQAAHE. At the regional level, CANQATE will set up a framework for communication, and for academic, professional, and collegial support in quality assurance.

Aims and objectives

The aims and objectives of CANQATE are as follows:

 Promote and assist in the implementation of best practices in quality assurance (QA) in tertiary education; Provide up-to-date information on QA issues for Caribbean agencies/networks/tertiary institutions and organisations: • Ensure mutual recognition among QA agencies in the Caribbean; Support regional QA agencies in identifying funding to assist in their activities: • Advocate for national QA bodies in regional and international forums; • Work with other professional bodies on matters of QA and accreditation in the region:

• Support and advise CARICOM and other Caribbean regional bodies on matters pertaining to a regional framework for

QA; Develop a cadre of professionals in the field of QA in the region; • Encourage and support research in the field of QA in the region; Network regionally and internationally with similar organisations.

The way forward

At the inaugural CANQATE conference in 2004 in Jamaica, members of the Network agreed to: • Work with institutions, governments, CARICOM,

student organisations. employers and others to sustain and enhance the standards and quality of tertiary education in the region.

 Work together to increase the mutual recognition of qualifications to facilitate the movement of students and graduates within the region.

• Through cooperation on such matters as staff development (including the staff of both agencies and tertiary institutions), exchange of academic

reviewers and the sharing of information, seek to improve the capacity for quality assurance and accreditation in the region.

• Through partnership with INQAAHE and other agencies, form effective working relationships with other regional groupings of quality assurance and accreditation agencies. • Seek to establish productive links with professional associations and other similar bodies in the region.

• Help smaller countries in the region to sustain and enhance their capability to quality assure and accredit.

• Make potential students aware of the need to inform themselves of the accreditation status as appropriate of the institution or programme in which they are

interested. • Encourage public awareness of the role that quality plays in the education system particularly at the tertiary/higher education level.
